FOCSP Project Seeks To Improve Turtle Population Health In Lake Marburg

Turtles play important roles as members of Codorus State Park's ecosystem. Lake Marburg has several species of aquatic turtles, including painted turtles, musk turtles, snapping turtles, red eared sliders (which are an invasive species) and red-bellied turtles (which are a threatened species). Most turtles are active from April through October, when their daily cycle normally includes sleeping, foraging for food, and basking in the sun.

The population of red-bellied turtles have been under study given their status as threatened in Pennsylvania. They are believed to be threatened primarily as a result of habitat loss and degradation, with other factors such as introduced invasive species, environmental pollution, disease, and global climate change also contributing to the decline of their population.

Red-bellied turtles are a large freshwater species that has a reddish plastron and a prominent notch at the tip of its upper jaw. They are usually associated with relatively deep-water bodies. Habitat requirements include a soft bottom, numerous basking sites, and abundant aquatic plants, which form the staple of the turtles' diet.

Typically, red-bellied turtles mate in the spring, eggs are laid in June and July, and hatching begins in late August and lasts through September. Young turtles are omnivorous (feeding on both plants and animals) but older adults seem exclusively herbivorous (animals that feed on plants). The turtles eat in the morning on snails, insects, crayfish, fish, tadpoles, small turtles, and aquatic vegetation and spend the rest of the day basking in the sun.

Basking is essential for their health, which makes the turtle platforms in the lake so important. Basking helps turtles to dry out their shells, ward off viral infection, reduce harmful parasites, and helps regulate their body temperatures.





Due to the importance of basking to turtles, Friends of Codorus (FOCSP) volunteers Jerry Boxman and Mike Rottmund, working in concert with park Environmental Education Specialist Renae Weidner and Park Maintenance Manager Dan Clark, have been building new platforms and placing them in the lake to increase their number on the lake and replace old ones. Currently, eighteen platforms are located throughout the lake. Many are now on mud flats due to low water levels, which may necessitate placing them in deeper water. Jerry and Mike constructed seven new basking platforms last fall and plan to build ten more this year.



So, whether hiking, picnicking, fishing, or boating, take the time to notice the turtles enjoying the basking platforms. And be sure to give them a wide berth. Witten by Jerry Boxman, Director.
